

PERIOD COVERED: 290630-300630 local based on information available in the Joint War Room as of 0630 EST Friday, 30

a. There were no significant troop movements reported

b. General Bounleut reported Vientiane forces control Vientiane-Irang Prabang road from Luang Prabang south to Nam Ming, and from Vientiane north to Lik River. The area

in between is under PL/Kong Le control with a major concentration of Pathet Lao at Muong Kassy.


c. An agreed estimate of enemy forces in the entire

Muong Kassy - Vang Vieng area is 400-600 Kong Le troops

and 1,000 to 2,000 Pathet Lao, some of which are directly

in support of Kong Le.

d. Lao Army headquarters has developed a new operation plan for the attack on Vang Vieng using coordinated drives from the north, northeast and south. e. Task Force 1, with a strength of 2,150 troops will advance in two columns by highway and river from Luang Prabang toward Vang Vieng. Task Force 2, with a strength of 1,750 troops including Meo tribesmen will move overland from Plaine des Jarres. Task Force 5 with a strength of 1,500 troops supported by 2 batteries of 105 howitzers will continue the move north from Vientiane. f. The current front line units will continue mop up operations through 30 December, link up with Task Force 5 from Vientiane, and establish a holding position just south



In an interim report of photo reconnaissance mission conducted on 26-27 Dec., USAIRA South Vietnam states that one photo of an IL-14 in the Vang Vieng area shows a peculiar protuberance which indicates the craft may have been armed. h. Observers on the flight report Kong Le's position in Vang Vieng appears to be highly defensible. During flight, there was no sign of General Phoumi's troops north of Vang Vieng for a distance of 20 miles.






b. CINCPAC has again strongly emphasized the necessity of stopping the Communist airlift into Laos. He feels that the build-up of Pathet Lao forces must not assume such proportions that defeat of Phoumi and even the capture of Vientiane and Luang Prabang will result. He advocates the use of gasoline drum fire bombs against Pathet Lao supply dumps and aircraft on the ground. The concentration of supplies and troops at Vang Vieng makes that location the first priority target.






support approximately 10,000 additional troops that have just been authorized. All of these items are being expeditiously handled. Of the 18 aircraft assigned to the airlift, 5 have arrived and 12 are enroute having departed from CONUS or points of origin in PACOM. The estimated time of arrival BANGKOK is 96 hours after departure from CONUS.
