Reconnaissance

11 October

(U) The JCS directed SAC to deploy SR-71 aircraft, equipment, and personnel to Griffiss AFB, N.Y., to await tasking for photo-reconnaissance missions in the Middle East. Two SR-71As assigned to the 91st Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, Beale AFB, Calif., were sent.¹

(A Middle East reconnaissance fragmentary order called GIANT REACH already existed. It called for an SR-71 sortie to launch from Beale AFB, California, and to recover after the mission at [redacted] T

(b)(1) The plan also called for refueling by KC-135 tankers from [redacted] (b)(1)

[redacted] although they could recover there after the mission. This made it necessary for SAC to plan round-robin missions from the U.S. and doubled the size of the refueling force required for the recon missions.)²

13 October

(U) SAC executed the first GIANT REACH photo reconnaissance mission in the Middle East. Targets designated for photography were [redacted] (b)(1)

An SR-71 of the 9 SRW left Griffiss AFB at 0600Z. The crew consisted of [Lt Col J. H. Shelton, Jr.] (pilot) and [Lt Col G. L. Coleman] (Reconnaissance Systems Officer). Flying to the target required three refuelings (in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, [redacted] and south of Crete). [redacted] in the target area. Three more refuelings were required on the homeward leg (again south of Crete, off the coast of Portugal, and in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence). The SR-71 landed back at Griffiss at 1715Z. Total flight time was 11 hours and 13 minutes and surpassed the previous record of 10 hours and 30 minutes set in April 1971. Fourteen KC-135Q tankers supported this mission. Extensive ferrying operations were required to move the special JP-7 fuel used by the SR-71 from storage areas [redacted] and Little Rock AFB.³

(U) ~~(S)~~ SAC executed the second GIANT REACH photo reconnaissance mission in the Middle East. Major targets designated for high resolution photography were [redacted]

(U) ~~(S)~~ The SR-71 left Griffiss AFB, N.Y., at 0600Z. Crew members were Capt E. W. Joersz (pilot) and Capt J. T. Fuller (reconnaissance systems officer). En route to the target area the airplane received three refuelings (south of Nova Scotia, north of the Azores, and south of Crete). The airplane spent [redacted] over the target and returned home. Three more refuelings were required (south of Crete, [redacted] and south of Nova Scotia). The SR-71 landed back at Griffiss 1713Z. Thus the launch and recovery time for the first two SR-71 sorties were identical.

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(U) [redacted] the first SR-71 mission prompted an alteration of refueling tracks on the 25 October mission. During the first GIANT REACH mission [redacted]

4 November (U) SAC flew its third GIANT REACH photo reconnaissance mission in the Middle East. The JCS had asked the mission be flown on 2 November but poor weather in the target area necessitated that it be postponed two days. Highest priority targets for the cameras [redacted]

(U) The SR-71 left Griffiss AFB, N.Y., at 0600Z. The crew consisted of Capt R. C. Helt (pilot) and Capt L. A. Elliot (reconnaissance systems officer). Refueling areas outbound and inbound were the same as those used in the 25 October mission. The SR-71 spent [redacted] over the target. It landed back at Griffiss 1722Z. This exceeded by nine minutes the two flights of 13 and 25 October and thus became the longest SR-71 flight to date.

Refueling of Fighters Being Ferried to Israel

12 October (U) Two KC-135s from Pease AFB, N. H., provided "Coronet East 35" refueling for the flight of two F-4 "Phantom" fighters to Lajes AB, Azores. This marked the beginning of SAC refueling support [redacted]

13 October (U) Second Air Force formed a tanker task force (TTF) at Pease AFB, N. H., under the command of Colonel Donald B. Shen, 45th Air Division Director of Operations. It consisted of 11 KC-135s of the 34th and 509th Air Refueling Squadrons.

"Coronet East 47"

~~(S)~~ Eight F-4s flew from Seymour-Johnson AFB to [redacted] non-stop. At the same time, four F-4s flew from Seymour-Johnson to Lajes Field, Azores. The mission was supported by 12 tankers from the Pease ~~Wing~~ and eight SAC tankers [redacted]

"Coronet East 35A"

~~(S)~~ Six F-4s deployed from Lajes Field to [redacted]. These were the two Coronet East 35 aircraft and the four Coronet East 47 aircraft. These were refueled by 2 KC-135 tankers flying out of Lajes and four tankers [redacted]

15 October (U)
"Coronet East 51"

~~(S)~~ Eight F-4s flew from Seymour-Johnson, North Carolina, to Lajes Field, Azores, supported by 8 KC-135s of the 301st Air Refueling Wing and four Lajes based tankers.¹¹

16/13522 Oct (U)

~~(S)~~ CINCEUR said that due to heavy airlift and aircraft transfer operations [redacted] and the political sensitivity of some allies and neutrals in the Mediterranean area, it was essential that unscheduled or unusual aircraft movements (aborts, diversions, incidents) be reported to CINCEUR and appropriate MAAG as soon as possible. Information was needed by the U.S. Embassy and/or MAAG personnel in order to explain circumstances to host country if queried.¹²

~~(S)~~ Four more F-4s deployed from McDonnell Douglas Corporation, Saint Louis, to Lajes Field, Azores, supported by four KC-135s of the 41st Air Refueling Squadron, Griffiss AFB, New York.¹³

~~(S)~~ Eight F-4s deployed from Lajes Field, Azores, to [redacted]. They were supported by four tankers of the Lajes TTF and six KC-135s [redacted]

"Coronet East 53"

~~(S)~~ Ten F-4s were flown from Eglin AFB, Fla., to Lajes Field, Azores, supported by 13 KC-135s from several Second Air Force units.¹⁵

~~(S)~~ Four F-4s moved from Lajes Field, Azores, to [redacted] supported by two KC-135s from Lajes and three [redacted]¹⁶

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17/0344Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ JCS provided guidance for aircrews delivering aircraft [redacted] regarding selection of emergency or alternate landing fields.

(U) ~~(S)~~ In the event an aircraft had to divert to an airfield [redacted] Lajes or military and civilian fields in Portugal were acceptable alternates. If Portugal was not feasible, Sigonella AB, Sicily, or other U.S. air bases in Italy could be selected.

(U) ~~(S)~~ JCS provided a priority list to aid aircraft commanders in making emergency base selection. [redacted]

18/0337Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ The Chief of Staff, USAF said [redacted] [redacted] [redacted] The CoFS noted that [redacted] the USAF refrain from using [redacted] the operation would be severely hindered.

(U) ~~(S)~~ SAC was requested to prepare a plan that would continue the same general refueling area and routes enroute to Israel but one which would put refueling areas [redacted]

18 October (U) ~~(S)~~ Two F-4s ferried from Lajes Field to [redacted] supported by two Lajes tankers and two [redacted]

19 October (U) ~~(S)~~ [redacted] [redacted] Such flights were not handicapped and refuelings were still accomplished by tankers flying from Lajes [redacted]

19 October (U) ~~(S)~~ Ten Navy A-4 "Skyhawk" aircraft ferried from Norfolk NAS to Lajes supported by 6 tankers of the Pease TTF. 21

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25/0737Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ The JCS reported on the current situation. The most recent communication from the Soviets contained a request that the U.S. join them in more forceful enforcement of the Israel/Arab cease-fire by the introduction of forces from both countries. The Soviets also stated intentions to consider unilateral action if the U.S. declined to join them in bilateral action.

(U) ~~(S)~~ Chairman JCS said that U.S. reply was not yet firm, but U.S. response included signal of elevation in force readiness-

Warren AFB, WY., then dejected in preparation for turnover to civilian contractors for modernization, would not be generated to alert. No additional facilities would be prepared for turnover, however, until further notice.³⁸

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25/2048Z Oct (U) Klaxon horns in bomber alert facility at Kinchloe AFB, Michigan, sounded for no apparent reason. Crews responded by proceeding to aircraft and starting engines. The command post then recalled them to proper alert status.⁶¹

26/1900Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ CINCSAC told JCS that he had completed all [redacted] actions at 26/1900Z. (SAC alert force returned to normal [redacted] status.) 14

26/1900Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ Hq SAC Command Post Battle Staff functions would terminate at 26/2200Z. After that time all questions and/or problems would be directed to numbered air force or SAC headquarters office of primary responsibility. 15

At this point in time, just after the return of SAC [redacted] posture, of the [redacted] missile launchers possessed by SAC [redacted] were on alert. [redacted] other launchers were in the hands of contractors and not available for alert.⁷²

(U) ~~(S)~~ All [redacted] sorties which had been generated were authorized off alert at this time. Units were to insure that all [redacted] sorties were generated to alert status. Aircraft at satellite bases would remain there. Tanker units supporting Tanker Task Force would continue to support task force. Upon completion of task force commitment units would generate [redacted] sorties to alert. [redacted] tanker sorties would be generated to alert status regardless of rated bomber status.⁸⁰

Redeployment of B-52s From the Pacific

12/0200Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ General Meyer recommended to Admiral Moorer that about 100 B-52s and their supporting tankers be returned from the Western Pacific and used to reconstitute combat ready strategic units in the Continental United States. He recommended this action because of the "Current situation in the Middle East and the inherent uncertainty of future developments"

(U) ~~(S)~~ With the departure of the above aircraft about 63 B-52s would be left in the Western Pacific. Forty-two of the 63 would be located at U-Tapao for contingency operations in the area. These aircraft could be augmented by redeployment from the Continental United States, with the first aircraft arriving not later than 72 hours after notification.⁸¹

25/0455Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ JCS ordered all B-52Gs on Guam to be deployed to Continental United States bases as soon as possible.⁸²

25/0830Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ SAC ordered all B-52G aircraft and G crews from Guam to deploy to the Continental United States. Twenty-six Gs would redeploy to Barksdale AFB and 15 each to Fairchild, Mather, and Robins AFBs.⁸⁴ Seven KC-135s would redeploy from [redacted] to the CONUS. B-52G redeployment would begin as soon as possible.

25/1706Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ First cell of B-52G aircraft launched from Guam as part of the BULLET SHOT redeployment of B-52s to the United States.⁸⁵

26/0130Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ SAC reported that redeployment of 71 B-52Gs and 7 KC-135s from Andersen AFB to CONUS bases began 25/1706Z and redeployment continued.⁸⁶

28/1600Z Oct (U) Statement was to be released to the press by CINCSAC that SAC had now completed the redeployment of about 70 B-52s from the Western Pacific to four bases in the United States. The redeployment of associated support equipment and personnel would be completed within the next two weeks. He said that the B-52 forces remaining in the Western Pacific were adequate to meet current requirements, but if required the above B-52s could be returned to the Pacific on short notice. Above was released to press at 28/1600Z Oct 73.⁸⁷

29/0330Z Oct (U) ~~(S)~~ CINCSAC dispatched to Eighth Air Force, Guam, a warning order for the deployment from Andersen AFB to the United States of 16 B-52D aircraft. Eight would go to Dyess AFB, Texas, and 8 to March AFB, California.⁸⁸

29/2258Z Oct (U) At 30/1700Z CINCSAC would announce the redeployment of 16 additional B-52s previously stationed at Andersen AFB, Guam, to the United States. About 25 B-52s remained on Guam and 50 in Thailand. These were adequate to meet current level of preparedness in the Western Pacific.⁸⁹
