MEMORANDUM FOR

MR. BUNDY MR. SMITH

In regard to Mr. Bundy's suggestion that the conferences established in the Gold Book in the emergency nuclear program include the Secretary of State, General Goodpaster responded for the Joint Chiefs of Staff after a discussion of this matter:

- a. Fundamentally, they believe that the Gold Book solution will never take place and that any other earlier conferences in regard to these procedures would automatically include the Secretary of State.
- b. The Gold Book business, in their minds, is really a military command procedure in which they would go downthe line after national decisions have been taken, and, consequently, there is no need to list the Secretary of State because it is more or less a military chain of command procedure.
- c. In the extreme case that we were going through the Gold Book procedure when "national decisions had not been previously taken," the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Secretary of Defense feel that the Secretary of State would be included by instinct, if there were time, and if there were no time, the procedures should not demand any change in these emergency steps.

In short, they feel the Secretary of States is adequately taken care of without changing any of the text or instructions in the Gold Book.

The Joint Chiefs are personally willing to discuss this further if the President or Mr. Bundy feelsdeeply about it.
