The President welcomed Minister Watanabe to the White House and the Oval Office. (U)

The President: Welcome my friend, good to see you here in the Oval Office. (U)

Minister Watanabe: Thank you, it's my privilege to be here. (U)

<u>The President</u>: I'd like to talk about the Uruguay Round and about the environment. We need to stay together on the environmental meeting in Brazil. We have to find a way to keep the developing countries from sending a big bill to the developed countries and to the United States. $(\not c)$

The Uruguay Round is important, and I hope you'll be able to do your best to support this. (c)

I hosted a meeting here with the EC President Delors and we discussed agricultural issues. I hope to reach a solid position by the end of June. (\mathbf{z})

We hope we are not put in a position of isolation in Rio. I will not slow down the economy for an anemic recovery because of the Earth Summit. (q)

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<u>Minister Watanabe</u>: I agree with you completely, that's exactly my personal feeling. Twenty years ago I took a strong stand on behalf of the environment. There will be technology breakthroughs. I hope we'll be able to achieve those that will help us with the environment. It is Japan and the United States which should cooperate; we can do this, we have the technology to achieve this. (U)

<u>The President</u>: Kind of like the old North-South issues. I do not want to see a bill to the United States, Europe and Japan to pay for past inequities. But there is something up in New York that we can agree to and should. (\not)

<u>Minister Watanabe</u>: I am told that we will do what we can do to find a way to cooperate. The U.S. and Japan have expertise and we should make this available. (U)

By the way, I visited China and while I was in China I told them that human rights were important. (U)

The President: Good, I'm glad to hear that. I'm trying to help them, you know, with MFN. (U)

Minister Watanabe: I did discuss it. (U)

The President: Thank you very much. I've got to go now. Nice to have had you with us. (U)

<u>Minister_Watanabe</u>: Thank you. (U)

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
